A **black** inking composition was to be used for the gridiron postmark and a **blue** inking composition for the date-stamp (side-mark) on the cover (Circular letter of December 12th 1854). However, since it was not explicitly mentioned that the black inking composition should be reserved for the new gridiron handstamp, some postmasters, e.g. Mr. Christian Fredrik Brøgger in Tromsø, started to use the black inking composition for the side-mark as well. This malpractice was stopped by an announcement from the Gemeral post administration (Circular letter of April 25th 1855)
