S/S Constitutionen

Bergen - Hammerfest 1851 - 1860

S/S Constitutionen was introduced in the Nordland line in September 1855. In 1856 the ship went into a regular 4 week cycle with "Prinds Gustav", "Prinds Carl" and "Nordcap". The ship got a circular dated handstamp with text "CONSTITUTIONEN" in June 1855.

Because of shortage of handstamps in the "NORDLAND" series, the sub-postmaster on board, Mr. Hans Severin Øyen, got no "NORDLAND" handstamp and instead used the ship's canceller "CONSTITUTIONEN" in the Nordland route as well. This date-stamp is known to have been used on altogether six trips between Bergen and Hammerfest in 1856. Outside the Nordland p. o. jurisdiction area, i.e. in the Troms post district (north of Tromsø), the sub-postmaster crossmarked the stamps with black ink and side-marked the letter with the date-stamp "CONSTITUTIONEN", or occasionally postmarked with his signature "H. S. Øyen" (with or without date) in manuscript directly on the postage stamp. A pen manuscript cancellation "C Constit C", is also recorded on 4 skill Oscar, probably made by the sub-postmaster on a trip (no. 12) in 1857

Postage due letter of May 4, 1856, from Christiania to Lenvig in Finmark; with origin postmark "CHRISTIANIA" and listed "5 (bill no.)—5 (Sk to pay)" on reverse, sent with S/S Constitutionen on the 10th northbound trip from Bergen to Hammerfest and postmarked "CONSTITUTIONEN 14-5-1856" in black ink

The ship's date-stamp was used within the Nordland postcontoir jurisdiction area as a substitute handstamp for the "NORDLAND" date-stamp
