Hammerfest (Vadsø) - Hamburg line 1865 - 1896

The Norwegian government and the private steamship companies Det Bergenske Dampskibsselskap (BDS) and Det Nordenfjeldske Dampskibsselskab (NFDS) negogiated in 1865 to undertake the route between Trondheim and Hammerfest. An agreement was concluded on March 23, 1865, which awarded the companies a virtually uninterruped, continuous route from Hammerfest to Hamburg, with six ships in weekly departures. New circular date-stamps with "HMRFST—HMBRG" (type 1) and litras from A to F were placed in use in autumn 1865. During the first months, the postal agents on board the three steamers "Finmarken", "Nordland" and "Nordstjernen" used the old "NORDLAND" date-stamps to cancel mail. The assignment of the six different handstamps were as follows: A to S/S Finmarken; B to S/S Jupiter; C to S/S Nordstjernen; D to S/S Håkon Jarl; E to S/S Nidelven; and F to S/S Nordland. Some allocations of the initial distribution of litras occurred during the sailings
